Effective immediately **John Walker** will be recognized as the **Executive Pastor of Pastoral Care & Operations**. 

### Church Family:

I have been requested to share some biblical principles that guide my voting in elections. I am reticent to do so for the following reasons: (1) I do not believe there is a large "market" for my ideas; people have their own, thank you very much; (2) I do not want to be accused of partisanship or endorsing a candidate; (3) it is easy to be misunderstood by hyper partisans and others who take politics more seriously than the gospel; (4) it is too easy to get church people "stirred up in a lather" over politics and nearly impossible to get them "stirred in a lather" over evangelism and souls.

That said, I do have some thoughts about elections and their consequences that I have not found in other places. I believe a discussion on this matter is worth the effort because God can use it to build Great Commissionaries. Jesus Christ is Lord, and He is to function as Lord when we enter the voting booth. That is enough for me to address Christians and the upcoming election.

I have several questions I ask of candidates before I decide who to vote for. You will notice that one important question does not appear, and that is the question "Who is the most moral candidate?" That is an important question, but I do not ask that question now because I have no way of knowing who today is the most moral candidate. Frankly, the way the two candidates speak about their opponents is repulsive. Further, nearly every presidential candidate after Jimmy Carter has had some serious moral deficiency in their pasts before running for president. I wish all of them had personal lives and reputations like President Jimmy Carter. That is not an option in most presidential elections (It is in most local and state elections).

Most of the questions I ask about candidates involve policy and how their proposed policies intersect with the Christian faith and mission. With some candidates we have a record. We do in this election with both President Trump and Vice-President Biden. Sometimes we do not have much of a voting record at all as in the case of President Obama. We also have their promises and their party's platforms. All Americans should consult these. With that said, here are the questions I ask before deciding who will receive my vote.

1. Which candidate will create an economy that will enable Christians and churches to give more to missions and fund more missionaries? A robust economy is necessary for Christians to have the wherewithal to fund kingdom work. The candidate who wants my vote must create economic conditions that make it possible for us to live out to the max the missionary texts of Matthew 28:18–20 and 2 Corinthians 8–9.

2. Which candidate will appoint judges and implement policy that will protect religious liberty for all Americans? Two schools of thought dominate thinking in America on this matter. Some think government should be in a position to order churches to close, to sing, or to meet. Our church believes that that is the role of Jesus Christ alone. What do the candidates think on this matter? The candidate who wants my vote must make it possible for us to live out to the max the religious liberty texts of Matthew 22:21 and Philippians 2:9–12.

3. Which candidate will appoint judges and implement policies that protect unborn children? Unborn children are the most murdered persons in the history of humanity. Which candidate gives America the best opportunity to end this holocaust against the unborn? The candidate who wants my vote must make it possible for us to live out to the max the pro-life texts of Exodus 21:22–25 and Psalms 139:1–24.

4. Which candidate will bring with him the most godly, Christ-minded, prayerful Americans with him into his administration? The president does very little actual work of his administration. Many within his administration work independently in offices that directly impact the lives of Americans. They are unelected, so they need a vital, robust walk with God to have the discernment necessary for their work. The candidate who wants my vote must make it possible for us to live out to the max the social texts of Proverbs 1:10—19 and 1 Corinthians 15:33.

5. Which candidate has done and proposes to do the most for poor American citizens? Which one has a track record and future plan to create an economy that lifts the poor so that they can give like Great Commissionaries? The candidate who wants my vote must make it possible for us to live out to the max the justice texts of 1 Samuel 8:10—18 and Romans 13.

These are the five questions I will ask the first Tuesday of November provided a Godzilla sized turkey does not descend upon the nation and eat us in a stunning act of irony. Remember. It is 2020.
